

Pastoral Letter

Tonight, I marvel at the roaring rivers, their danger and beauty. They attract life, like the foxes we saw earlier. One was happily nipping at bugs, playfully jumping back and forth. The other limped in the dark, alone and constantly looking over its shoulder. For both foxes, I wonder: how can they survive in the same environment as bears, wolves, bison, and moose? They are so tiny! Cunning or not, a wolf is a wolf, repeat with emphasis for bears and bull meese. How can they live and play, limp and hide surrounded by so much beauty and danger? God is also described as beautiful and dangerous. The OT features many direct encounters with the Divine that leave humans hurt, scarred, or dead! For the people's enemies, too, there was death, plaque, ruin, and chaos. This doesn't seem to jive with Jesus, at least not at first. Jesus left people better than he found them: healed, grown, loving disciples where once there were ordinary people. There's certainly beauty; where is there danger? For us, there is danger in the change, the interruption, the metamorphosis. We won't be who we were before, and that scares us! But really, the danger isn't exuded by Jesus; he faces it. Humans prove ourselves, our institutions, our governments are the predators of God's good work and will. They "come like a thief in the night to steal, to kill, and to destroy." But Jesus faced it, sometimes joyous and sometimes limping, knowing that a beloved, loving community would be worth it all.

Dear Friends at Glendive UMC and Wibaux UMC: I celebrate with you that Bishop Kristin G. Stoneking intends to assign Pastor Phillip "Phil" Spicer as pastor of your churches effective July 1, 2025. A Lay Supply Pastor, Pastor Phil comes to the Montana East District from Rye Home UMC in Rye, Colorado, where he has been an active member.

Committed to practicing the presence of God every day, Pastor Phil says:

I know the power of being forgiven and the joy of being changed. God's

grace continues to shape me, so I am becoming more present, willing,

and rusting of God's leading.

Pastor Phil completed the UMC General Board of Higher Education and Ministry Licensing School for Pastoral Ministry in October 2024. In Licensing School, he studied United Methodist tradition, spiritual formation, pastoral care, leadership and administration, Christian education, mission, evangelism, and worship – including the sacraments, funerals, weddings, and preaching.

Pastor Phil is on the way toward becoming a certified candidate for a local pastor license with the District Committee on Ministry in the Eastern/Southcentral Colorado District of the Mountain Sky Conference.

Pastor Phil's strengths include administration, communication, and teaching. Pastoral care and hospital visitation are fulfilling for him, as he is honored to be present with people in times of life transitions. Connecting with people one-on-one is important for Pastor Phil. A "people person," he enjoys getting to know who people are and what matters to them in their faith journey and daily life.

Pastor Phil shares about his own faith journey:

growth, realizing God had been shaping me through every trial.

Growing up on a farm, Pastor Phil knows the hard work of raising crops, cattle, goats, and chickens. Rural life is in his blood.
