

- After the sale, unsold items will be donated to the Attic or the Zion furniture room OR thrown away.
- If you have large items (like furniture), please wait until just a few days before the sale to bring them to the church. It would be helpful if you would let Andrine or Vernone know that such items will be coming.
- Bake sale items should be delivered to the church on the days of the sale. Please have items wrapped/packaged for sale.

We are making plans to do the sale with safety precautions – wearing masks; limiting overcrowding by directing traffic, limiting the number of shoppers and having extra cashier stations.

So let's make a little extra money for the church while we clean out our closets!
