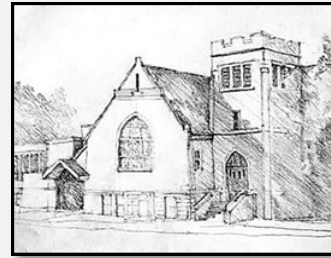

## Pastoral Letter/Pastorz Corner

Hello everyone,

Over the past several weeks, one particular scripture has continued to guide me through my transition into pastoral leadership. I always remember the NIV translation as this was the translation of the Bible I received following my baptism and confirmation at First United Methodist Church of Surgoinsville, Tennessee. However, the verse that has continuously run through my mind is, "Come all who are weary and burdened..." (Matthew 11:28 NIV). The verse comes after Jesus has traveled all throughout the region of Galilee. He has healed several people, given the Sermon on the Mount, and commissioned the disciples to preach the good news to the people of Israel.

Chapter 11 is labeled, at least in my Common English Study Bible, as *Ministry to the People*. Jesus begins the chapter by talking about John the Baptist and answering folks' questions regarding who Jesus and John the Baptist are. In verse 28, and in my Common English Bible (CEB), it reads, "<sup>28</sup> Come to me, all you who are struggling hard and carrying heavy loads, and I will give you rest. <sup>29</sup> Put on my yoke and learn from me. I'm gentle and humble. And you will find rest for yourselves. <sup>30</sup> My yoke is easy to bear, and my burden is light" (Matthew 11:28-30 CEB).

Although this translation is slightly different from my beloved NIV translation as a youth, this translation provides a different perspective on the message of Jesus. In verse 28, Jesus invites us to come and rest with him. It is not a demand, nor is it a requirement, but it is an invitation to be welcomed to a space where we can find comfort. It is also interesting the translation says those, "who are struggling hard." We have all been in situations where our burden seems too large to bear. This is an invitation to those who are not only tired, but it is for those who are mightily struggling in their lives.

Jesus also says, "Put on my yoke, and learn from me." This speaks to me because Jesus is asking us to be empathetic to one another's struggles. He tells us in this passage that he, just like us, has struggles of his own. He asks us to learn from this experience of empathy, humble ourselves, and learn to develop gentleness (Matthew 11:29). He concludes with helping us understand we bear the weight of one another together (Matthew 11:30). - Continues next page
